Administrative history:

The City of Vancouver was created under the Vancouver Incorporation Act on April 6, 1886 and Malcolm A. MacLean was appointed the first Mayor. Hastings Townsite became part of the City on January 1, 1911. The Corporation of Point Grey and the Corporation of the District of South Vancouver amalgamated with the City on January 1, 1929.

In 1953, a provincial statute, the Vancouver Charter, superseded the Vancouver Incorporation Act 1886. The City's mandate and functions are outlined in the Charter. Other provincial legislation, such as the Library Act and the Police Act, determines the responsibilities of City boards and commissions.

Custodial history:

The custodial history of the fonds is unknown until 2005, when it first appears in the Vancouver Police Museum's *Archives Finding Aid*. It is assumed that series F1-S1 entered the Museum's custody in 1996 when the City Analyst's Laboratory vacated the shared premises at 240 East Cordova Street.

Scope and content:

The fonds contains one series reflecting the activities of the City Analyst's Laboratory, which provided physical and chemical analytical services to the City of Vancouver, particularly the Health, Engineering and Police Departments, and toxicological services to the City Coroner.

Administrative history:

The Office of the City Analyst was established in 1892 as the Health Department. The Office of the City Analyst provides consultation, physical, and chemical analytical services to various City of Vancouver departments and other agencies. As Health Department, the Office also conducted food inspections from 1924-1949. Functions include inspecting environmental contaminants in water, soil, and waste. The Office of the City Analyst also provides services to the VPD and the Office of the Chief Constable in assisting investigations of homicide, sexual assault, arson, impaired driving, and toxicology reports.

Scope and content:

The series contains seven bound volumes documenting the daily receipt of exhibits for analysis and the type of analysis requested. Exhibits submitted for analysis include blood, organs, milk and building materials.

Administrative history:

Coroner's services were an independent municipal endeavor until 1979, when the BC Coroners Act was legislated becoming a provincially organized body. From 1932-1979, Vancouver's coroner's services were operated out of the Coroner's Court and Morgue, located at 240 East Cordova Street (now the location of the Vancouver Police Museum). In 1980, services moved to Vancouver General Hospital. Coroner's work to ascertain and clarify circumstances surrounding all sudden and unexpected deaths, all deaths that occur in children under the age of 19, producing judicial documents such as a Judgement of Inquiry or Verdict at Coroner's Inquest and reports that may be used in court proceedings, collecting death information and statistical analyses, and promoting public awareness with the purpose of preventing deaths.

Scope and content:

The series contains records created by the Coroner's Court, both when it was municipally managed and provincially. The series contains predominantly receipts issued by the Coroner and Morgue, record books containing a register of people that have been autopsied and by whom, and an assortment of blank forms used by coroners.

Biographical sketch:

Joe Swan was born in 1935. He joined the Vancouver Police Department as a sworn officer in 1965, was a board member for the Vancouver Police Historical Society, and became the Vancouver Police Museum's first curator in 1986. Swan was also an amateur historian and wrote crime stories for a weekly *Police Beat* column published in local newspapers. He authored *A century of service: The Vancouver Police, 1886-1986*, which was published by the Vancouver Police Historical Society in 1986.

Custodial history:

The custodial history of the fonds is unknown until 2005, when it first appears in the Vancouver Police Museum's *Archives Finding Aid*. It is assumed that the fonds entered the custody of the Museum between 1986 and 1992 when Swan was Curator.

Scope and content:

The fonds contains manuscripts and proofs of short stories and non-fiction written by Swan.

Titles include: *Without fear or favour: The honour roll of the Vancouver Police* and *A century of service: The Vancouver Police, 1886-1986*.

Administrative history:

The Vancouver Incorporation Act 1886 gave the Vancouver City Council authority to appoint a Board of Police Commissioners with responsibility for oversight of policing in the City. The Board consisted of the Mayor, the Police Magistrate, and the City Clerk. In 1974 the Board became independent of municipal government with the passing of the provincial Police Act. The Act requires that the Board consist of the Mayor as Chair, one person appointed by the Vancouver City Council, and not more than seven persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The Vancouver Police Board continues to provide civilian governance and oversight of policing in accordance with the Act.

The Chief Constable of the Vancouver Police Department is directly responsible to the Board. Under the Police Act the duties of the Department are: to enforce municipal bylaws, the criminal law and the laws of British Columbia, generally maintain law and order in the municipality, and prevent crime. The Department is divided into three divisions, each commanded by a Deputy Chief Constable. The Operations Division includes patrol, the traffic section, emergency operational planning and emergency response. The Investigation Division includes major crime, organized crime, special investigations, and investigative support services. The Support Services Division provides administrative, operational, technological, and financial services. The first Chief Constable, John M. Stewart, was appointed on May 10, 1886.

Custodial history:

The custodial history of the fonds is unknown until 2005, when it first appears in the Vancouver Police Museum's archives finding aid. It is assumed that the fonds was gifted to the Museum ca. 1986, when the Museum began operations.

The Counter Exploitation Unit began as the Morality Squad in the 1920's, established to investigate drug, liquor, gambling, prostitution, and "morality" offenses. The Squad later became known as the Vice Squad, and in 2013, renamed to the Counter Exploitation Unit to better reflect the changing mission of the department. The Counter Exploitation Unit investigates crimes related to violence, exploitation, youth, and human trafficking.

Scope and content:

The series contains monthly reports on work performed by the Morality Squad. The reports cover the period of February 1920-March 1922. The series also contains records related to the Penthouse Cabaret investigations and prostitution in Vancouver.

Administrative history:

Established in 1920 by Chief Constable James Anderson, the Investigation Squad, as it was known then, was responsible for all fingerprinting and photography, as well as all “scientific investigation” at crime scenes. Today, the Forensic Services Section’s role is to apply forensic sciences to analyze evidence that will be admissible in court and investigations for major crime. The Section assists all VPD investigators with gathering forensic evidence. The Forensic Services Section consists of the Forensic Identification Unit (FIU), Crime Scene Investigation Unit (CSIU), Forensic Firearm & Toolmark Unit, BC AFIS Unit, Technological Crime Unit, and Forensic Video Unit. The Forensic Services Section employs skills such as anthropology, blood splatter analysis, contamination control, DNA analysis, fingerprint analysis, footwear impression analysis, hair and fiber collection, photography, scene measurements and scale drawings, tire impressions and tool mark castings.

Scope and content:

Series contains records and supporting materials relating to forensic investigations from 1907 to 1999. The series contains manuals, materials received from conferences, early-century fingerprints, and monthly reports.

The Vancouver Police Mounted Squad was first formed in 1908, with 11 officers and 12 horses. In 1909 the first patrolman on horseback was assigned to patrol Stanley Park. By 1911, the Squad had 20 riders and a second stable was opened near the entrance of Stanley Park. Due to WWI, the Mounted Squad was reduced to only two members by the end of 1916. The 1920s and 1930s were a time of labour unrest, unemployment, demonstrations, and riots in Vancouver and the Mounted Squad began to rebuild. In 1939, they provided escort for the Royal Visit of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth on a Vancouver visit. By 1949, the Squad was disbanded after it was decided that it was no longer needed. However, in 1951, the Squad was hastily and temporarily re-established in order to provide an escort for Princess Elizabeth and her husband Philip for their tour of Stanley Park.

Since the 1960s, the Mounted Squad has been used in managing crowds at demonstrations and large-scale events, including the Gastown Riot, Grey Cup games, parades, and annual fireworks events. The horses continue to live in Stanley Park and patrol the park, the beaches on the west side of Vancouver, and the downtown core.

In 1915, the mandate for policing was transferred to the Board of Police Commissioners, who first met on February 5, 1915. The District of South Vancouver was amalgamated with the City of Vancouver on January 1, 1929.

Phyllis Emily Mortimore was born in Vancouver, BC on October 14, 1917. In 1943 at the age of 27, Mortimore was hired by the Vancouver Police Department (VPD) as one of the first female officers. During the Second World War, numerous VPD officers traveled overseas to serve and a number of women were hired as constables. However, policewomen were delegated only to cases regarding women and children. Mortimore opposed the internment of Japanese-Canadians, but assisted the RCMP in escorting people to confinement in her early professional years. In the 1950s, Mortimore advocated for pay equity for women in the VPD, who were then differentiated in a separate division, the Women's Division. In 1956 women on the VPD received a pay raise, and were newly allowed to compete with men for promotions. In 1957, Mortimore was the first woman promoted to the rank of Sergeant, earning the highest score of the 127 constables who wrote the exam that year. Despite her score, Mortimore had to lobby for the promotion, opening the opportunity for others to follow. Mortimore was also known for her pistol and revolver shooting skills, to which she competed and won numerous championships. In March 1973, a car accident caused early retirement. Mortimore was involved with many groups and associations including the Girl Guides (to which she became Area Commissioner), Christ Church, Senior Fellowship, Vancouver Police Credit Union, the International Police Women's Association, and the Vancouver Superannuated Police Officers Association. Mortimore died in Burnaby, BC on November 8, 2009.

Biographical history:

John Fleming Cullen Brown Vance was born on May 2, 1884 in Scotland to John and Marian Vance. Vance was the 2nd oldest of five siblings that included Jean, Thomas, James, and Frank. In 1890 his family moved to Vancouver, British Columbia.

In 1901 when Vance was 17 years old, he began his career in the mining industry. His first role was as an Assistant Assayer with J. O'Sullivan, Assayer, Analytical Chemist & Metallurgist. From there he worked as the Assistant Chemist at the War Eagle Cyanide Extraction Plant in Trail, B.C. While employed there, he developed a cone hood for a hot blast furnace which was a breakthrough in the industry at the time. Vance then worked with the Van Anda Mines & Smelter on Texada Island as Chief Assayer before moving to Blue River, Oregon to work for the Lucky Boy Mining Company. After a time he returned to B.C. and took a job at the Kamloops Mines. During this time Vance received his certificate in sampling & assaying from the Department of Mines in 1904.

On May 1, 1907 Vance was hired by the Corporation of the City of Vancouver as the City Analyst. Working under Dr. Fred Underhill, his chemistry background was put to use testing a wide range of commercial food products; samples of cement, asphalt and road oils for quality and durability; and regular analysis of water from Capilano Canyon and Seymour Creek to ensure it was safe to drink. As his career progressed, Vance would later be appointed to the role of Provincial Analyst and Dominion Analyst.

Like many of his neighbours, Vance was ardent about enlisting in the war effort. In 1914 he joined the Vancouver Volunteer Reserve as a Platoon Sergeant. He would spend the next two years trying to get permission from the City of Vancouver to join troops overseas but they would not grant him permission, citing that he was an invaluable and irreplaceable employee.

In 1914 Vance entered the world of forensics when he was asked by the Vancouver Police Department to analyze blood samples from a crime scene. His methodical nature and detailed

analysis quickly made him an asset to the VPD. A small laboratory was set up in the police department and his expertise and unique skill set was frequently relied upon to help solve murders, crimes, and other investigations.

Vance was known to work 6 days a week and was called out to collect evidence at all hours of the day. He was regularly called upon to testify in court and worked with the RCMP and other police jurisdictions throughout the province. His work involving blood analysis, fingerprints, firearms, document analysis, autopsy, arson, and toxicology was instrumental in both exonerating innocent suspects but also providing concrete evidence of crimes committed by accused individuals.

In 1932 Vance was appointed Honorary Inspector of the Police Department in charge of the Police Bureau of Science. That same year, a purpose-built City Analyst's laboratory opened at 238 East Cordova Avenue, Vancouver. The laboratory was one of the largest and best equipped police science laboratories in North America until it closed down in 1996. If a piece of equipment didn't exist that he needed, Vance invented it. In the 1930s he developed an ultra-violet ray machine that could be used to detect drugs, bodily fluids and counterfeit money. He also invented the Vancamoscope, a 'robot nose' that he believed could identify suspected persons by their scent.

Throughout his career, local newspapers often reported upon Vance's scientific approach to crime-fighting. International media dubbed him "Canada's Sherlock Holmes" and several true crime magazines included stories on him, written in sensational fashion. In 1934 Vance's reputation caught up with him during a series of investigations that led to seven attempts on his life including threatening letters, a car bomb, a bomb placed at his home, and an attack where he was ambushed in his garage and acid was thrown at him. During this time Vance and his family were under 24/7 police guard but that did not seem to deter the criminals from their target.

In addition to his work with the police, Vance maintained his regular daily work as the City Analyst and Chief Food and Dairy Inspector. He continued to test water, milk and other food items for their purity and quality. He also tested the alcohol content of bootleg liquor and presented his findings as evidence in court. He also completed toxicology work for the City of Vancouver Morgue. In 1939 Vance was given the role of the "Royal Analyst" and put in charge of inspecting everything that would be eaten during the royal visit of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth while in B.C.

After a long and dynamic career spanning 49 years, John Vance retired on April 6, 1949 at the age of 65 years old. His personal records include a hand-written employment history that notes:

- Provincial Assayer - Metallurgy, Province of BC, 1904 -1949
- Chief Chemist, City Analyst & Toxicologist for Corporation of City of Vancouver, 1907 - 1949
- Provincial Analyst, 1925 - 1949

- Dominion Analyst, 1930 - 1949
- Analyst Liquor Board (Control) of BC, 1925 - 1949
- Analyst, Bacteriologist, Greater Vancouver Water Board, 1926 - 1949
- Criminologist, Vancouver City Police Department Science Bureau, 1918 - 1949

- Member of Royal Sanitary Institute (England)
- Member of Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy
- Member of Society of Chemical Industry
- Honorary Member of Pharmaceutical Association of B.C.

On August 2, 1911, John Vance married Ethel Jane Burnes (1883-1960). They had 4 children: (son) John, b. 1912-; (son) Tom, (1913-1943, died in combat during WWII); (daughter) Marian, b. 1918-; and (daughter) Caroline, b. 1926-. John and Ethel lived in Vancouver for most of their lives before moving to South Surrey in their later years.

John Vance passed away on September 21, 1964 at the age of 80 years old. He is buried along with family members in a plot at the Mountain View Cemetery in Vancouver, B.C.

Custodial history: Records were in the original custody of John Vance until his death when they were transferred to family members who later donated the records to VPMA in 2017.

Scope and content:

The records in this fonds relate to the personal and professional activities of John Vance as a City Analyst and forensics investigator for the Vancouver Police Department throughout a career spanning 1907-1949. The records include both personal and professional correspondence, reports, working notes and calculations, research notes, investigation files, photographs and negatives, scrapbooks, certificates, newspaper clippings and magazines.
